Mini Convention Message: Living Blameless Lives in a Contemporary World Date: 04th May 2025 | Speaker: Rev. Dr. Esau Bbosa Kimanje Venue: St. Stephen's Luzira Church of Uganda

The mini convention held at **St. Stephen's Luzira C.O.U** on **04th May 2025** was graced by the presence and powerful teaching of **Rev. Dr. Esau Bbosa Kimanje**, who challenged the congregation with a timely and thought-provoking message titled "Living Blameless Lives in a Contemporary World."

Drawing from **Psalm 15:1-5**, Rev. Dr. Bbosa addressed a critical question many Christians wrestle with today: *Is it really possible to live with integrity and righteousness in a world full of lies, hypocrisy, and moral confusion?*

A Called to Shine in a Dark World

In a world where even, trusted figures often lie and act hypocritically, Rev. Dr. Bbosa encouraged believers to live differently—to be stars that shine and bring light to others. He emphasized that, though challenging, living a blameless life is not only possible but powerful when we walk closely with God.

"With God, it is not only possible to live a blameless life—but it becomes a powerful witness of His grace."

He questioned whether those around us—especially our own children—can bear witness to our righteousness, reminding us that integrity is best revealed in the private spaces of life, not just in public appearances.

What It Means to Be Blameless - Psalm 15

Referencing **Psalm 15**, Rev. Dr. Bbosa laid out a vivid picture of what it means to be blameless in God's eyes:

- Walking in righteousness
- Speaking truth from the heart
- Avoiding slander and gossip
- Honouring the Godly
- Keeping promises even when it hurts
- Living justly and generously

These characteristics, he said, define the person who will dwell in God's sacred tent—those who are **not just religious**, **but transformed**.

Rev. Dr. Bbosa warned against hypocrisy in the Church, declaring that "there is no legitimate church that thrives in hypocrisy." As believers, we must first admit our sinfulness and then allow God's cleansing power to renew us. Leaders, especially, must take on the humility of being the "chief sinners" who lead others not by perfection, but by constantly pointing to the **cross of victory**.

He concluded by reminding everyone that we are all born sinners, but choosing to shun evil and follow Christ allows us to live blameless lives.

"Those who will sit in God's sanctuary are the blameless. Are you one of them?"

Final Reflection

This powerful sermon left a deep imprint on all who attended, challenging every believer to examine their hearts and live in such a way that they may truly reflect God's holiness in an increasingly ungodly world.

Let us go forth not just as hearers, but doers of the Word—committed to walking blamelessly before our God.
